# The fog of life can obscure our vision but not our purpose

Greetings friends! God's mission is to rescue lives consumed with strife on every side battered and torn by life's relentless hazards. Internal strife and the decimated lives of men and women characterize where God called me to serve Him sixteen years ago. I became a missionary (not paid by the city, state or county) to the incarcerated, and the Sheriff's Office staff. We have the best news, the Good News of deliverance from our sins to proclaim! To this calling you enter the trenches with me. **THANK YOU** for your partnership, and belief that God would use the Polk County Jail Ministry to impact lives for His glory!! What a blessing you are to me!

During my morning walk I came to a rise, and looked at the road down in the valley. A thick fog uniquely covered part of the road and all the scenery below. The Lord reminded me of how the path of life can be clear, but then suddenly we may find ourselves in a fog that impairs vision of the road ahead. We are all good at producing spiritual fog that blinds our sight, but if we examine the evidence the problem can be identified. It could be a toxic friendship, an unpaid debt, or an improper attitude that has caused

trouble. We must keep our lives in check lest we find ourselves in a fog that causes a disconnect with effective prayer. Since April 11th of last year I am still not able to see inmates face to face or go into the housing units called pods. What a disconnect to say the least when people are my passion. Mental health workers and attorneys have access in the housing units. I'm very thankful for the opportunities I do have on monitor screen visits in the lobby, so I'll keep walking by faith.

Recently a cook asked me to see an inmate worker who he was concerned about. This inmate received bad news that his kid sister had died. He also had a brother murdered in Chicago a year earlier. I pulled him aside and began listening as he told me about these painful losses. During our conversation he told me he was religious but empty inside. I shared that I was raised in church but my beliefs were in my head only and nothing was inside my heart. My life was empty. I had no meaning, purpose or direction, but God sent people who said I needed a relationship with Jesus Christ. God broke me and spoke to me

I am very honored that Chaplain Jerry asked me to share my testimony in the Jail Ministry newsletter. I pray that in the name of Jesus, God will bless others with my story. I was 12 years old the first time I got drunk and it was a blackout. I wish that experience would have changed my attitude and choices about alcohol. By the time I graduated from high school I had become a teenage alcoholic. I thank God for my Grandma Irene who was a follower of Jesus Christ, and I know she was always praying for me and her family. I'm realizing more and more that God has and

is answering her prayers. My alcoholism took me to very dark places, and a lot of rough patches in my past life. I have been arrested and convicted 5 times for operating while intoxicated, and numerous other alcohol related offenses throughout my adulthood. Every time that I was incarcerated I would pray to God, ask for forgiveness in Jesus name, start to read the Bible, attend the Bible studies offered through the Polk County Jail Ministry, and watch Chaplain Jerry's services. I wanted to change my life, but when

In June of 2020 just a few weeks after being released from the Jail I hit rock bottom which lead me to the House of Mercy for treatment once again. After completing inpatient treatment I went to live at the House of Grace owned and led by Ernie and Vicky Huffey who are members of Grace Church. It was at Grace Church where I got reconnected with Chaplain Jerry and his wife Patty, and many of the Jail ministry volunteers. I thank God for how they have come along side to help me grow in my relationship with Jesus Christ. This

past June I celebrated 1year of sobriety! All glory be to God the Father! Thank you Chaplain Jerry, Patty and all of my brothers and sisters in Christ.
